## MAKING THE GRADE

Lukome Center Students Maintain a 99% DIT Exam Success Rate
Recently, our Class 15 graduates of the Lukome Center took their
Uganda Directorate of Industrial Technology (DIT) certification
exams. We are pleased to announce that all of them passed with
high scores! This will be a great help to them as they seek to
obtain good jobs or establish strong small businesses in their
chosen areas of expertise, such as salon (hairdressing),
tailoring, and bakery. (See photo above.)

No one could be happier than Richard Kyitarinyeba, ChildVoice's Head of Office in Uganda, who exclaimed: "80 percent of them did really well!"

The Lukome Center was accredited for vocational training by Ugandan government starting with Class 10 several years ago. Since that time, members of all graduating classes have had the opportunity to take the DIT exam. Moreover, ChildVoice has reached out to students from earlier classes of the center as well, making the opportunity available to all who have graduated. To date, 100 out of the 101 Lukome Center graduates who have taken their DIT exams have passed. Of those, 15 are pre-Class 10 graduates who came back for the exam. [continued on page 2]

They also enjoy the psychological boost of validation in their own selfworth. It's one more way of restoring their hope as they progress through their journey toward a better future.

We look forward to following these proud students through our aftercare programs as they work to put their well-earned credentials to use!



## Strengthening Social Bonds and Building Hope through Community Service

An important aspect of all our therapeutic programs in Uganda and Nigeria is community service. These activities bring our students into closer contact with other people in their communities, helping to strengthen social bonds while raising the awareness of giving back to those in need. They also help serve to give students a sense of duty and purpose, bolstering their self-esteem and sense of self-worth as well as building a strong work ethic.

In preparation for community service in Gulu, Uganda, ChildVoice staff at the Lukome Center identified vulnerable people within the community, such as the elderly and disabled. A total of 28 students, accompanied by 17 staff members, visited 13 local homes, providing services such as fetching water, household cleaning, collecting rubbish, delivering food, providing counseling, and praying with residents.

Meanwhile in Nigeria, our students' community service in both the Malkohi internally displaced persons camp and in Mubi was focused primarily on compound cleaning (sweeping, collecting rubbish) and classroom painting. Boys in Malkohi performed a total of 73 hours of community service. Girls in Malkohi performed 323 hours, while girls in Mubi performed 78 hours.

## Mission Team Training in Slovakia, Latvia, & Estonia

One of my goals this summer was to learn more from our country teams about how they train their mission teams. So it was well worth the time and effort to travel to Slovakia, Latvia, and Estonia as they prepared their short-term mission

teams to serve at camp. It also meant that I got to spend more time with our interns. It is so good to check in with them and see how they are doing one month after I last saw them at Intern Training.







As a part of the Latvia Mission Team Trainings, the teams went to the former KGB headquarters preserved as a museum in Riga, Latvia. We had an excellent tour guide and I'm so thankful for the opportunity to learn more about Latvian history and how the Russian occupation impacted their culture.

### **English Camp in Estonia**

As a part of better understanding how teaching English plays a role in some of our camps, I joined a church in Rapla, Estonia for their English camp. Two of JV's summer interns were there as well as a mission team from Woodmen Valley Chapel in Colorado Springs and about 30 student campers.

Now as I get to be a part of preparing resources for local churches to use it is really helpful to keep Miriam in mind, who, like many youth leaders in Central and Eastern Europe, leads her peers (and even students older than her).



This is my discussion group! After every morning and evening session, we met to discuss that day's talk and theme. Ethan (on the far left) was my American co-leader who by the end of the week was leading the discussion!

Daniel didn't speak much English or Estonian so he spoke in Ukrainian which Rannar was able to translate into Estonian, which Kristin (my Estonian co-leader next to me) was able to then translate into English. Linnea (on the far right) was asking really great questions about what it means to pursue God in all areas of our life. Despite speaking 3 different languages we had some great discussions!

### Rapidly Winning Communities for Christ through Indigenous Disciple Makers

Dear Partners in Ministry,

Thank you for your continued and valued support. What an awesome summer season on the Mission Field!!

We are very excited about the number of Disciple-Maker Conferences that were presented, especially those initiated and taught by key Indigenous Leaders – a byproduct of the pandemic when foreigners could not travel. The 5 teams from the US and South Africa presented 21 Conferences and from the great responses of attendees, who were especially "hungry for teaching in the Word" because of the isolation they experienced over the last years. You, as supporting partners with HB Ministries, share in the joy and gratitude that these rural trainees (some traveling up to 80 miles over days) have expressed. Strategically placed Bibles, Bicycles and even 2 Motorcycles have been great motivators for expanding the footprint of the Disciple-Maker Program – overseers/trainers are empowered to get to and expand the areas that they serve with the Word.

Here are the needs identified during the Conference Trips:

- 800 Indigenous Language Bibles (\$12 each to buy and deliver to Disciples in classes).
- 22 Leaders need Bicycles in expanding areas (\$300 each to buy and deliver to the rural areas).
- 5 motorcycles are desperately needed (\$2,700 each, includes registration and a helmet, etc).
- The construction work at the Mongu Conference Center is almost complete. We need \$3,000 to do so.






## Welcome Bethany Masi: Client Service Director

## **Client Story: Courtney**

At the Women's Center we recently had the opportunity to sit down with Courtney, an unexpectedly pregnant 15 year old, and talk with her about her options.

Courtney's mom reached out to us looking for an ultrasound to date her daughter's pregnancy, telling us that her daughter was too young to have this baby. When Courtney came into the center, we gave her the space to share her heart as she spoke about how the news of the pregnancy was affecting her. She wept as she shared with us her conviction that the baby growing inside of her was a life that deserved a chance to live, and her very real fears of how raising a baby while still being so young would affect her present life, her future, and her familial relationships.

We talked with Courtney about the realities of abortion, the opportunities available through adoption, and the ways in which we would come alongside her in support if she chose to parent the child. Finally, we offered to support Courtney as she talked to her mother and boyfriend about how she was

really feeling regarding the pregnancy. Later, after this meeting, Courtney reached out to our office via text saying that she really did want to parent this child despite all the hardships that lie ahead. We reminded her that we will be with her every step of the way, supporting her in all the ways that we can.

Our interaction with Courtney serves as a reminder of how critical it is for women facing an unplanned pregnancy to have a non-judgmental space to process their emotions and options, so that they can decide for themselves what they want without outside pressures influencing them. Many of our clients face very real difficulties with their unplanned pregnancies, but having a protected space to explore their feelings and options gives them the opportunity to make their decision with confidence.



## **Baby Bottle Update**

Our Thank you to all of the churches that participated in our Baby Bottle Drive this year. This year we handed out roughly 1200 bottles and had 26 churches participate. All together we raised \$24, 608.78! ## HOW GOD USED YOU AND ANGEL TREE

to bring life-changing hope to a struggling mom and her sons









Aimee knows firsthand the many blessings of Angel Tree. That's why she leads the program for her church at Christmas and why her sons also volunteer with her.

Aimee can't forget a visit to her home at Christmas seven years ago.

Her husband, Thomas, had been sentenced to 17 years in prison the previous month. She was living in a rented trailer with their four sons, ages 6, 4, 2, and 1 at the time. As a dedicated mom, Aimee put on a cheerful face for the sake of her kids, but inside she felt empty, alone, and overwhelmed.

"You're suddenly a single parent," she remembers. "It's very isolating. There are so many needs."

And with Christmas just around the corner . . .



#### IT WAS ALMOST TOO MUCH TO BEAR

But then, there was a knock at her door.

Standing in the falling snow was a group of people from a nearby church. They held brightly wrapped Christmas gifts with special messages for each of the boys from their dad. Aimee's introduction to Prison Fellowship Angel Tree left her speechless.

"I felt that I wasn't forgotten," she remembers. "It's amazing that this organization does all this, how it can reach people down some dirt road living in a single wide. It's just so incredible."

Aimee says she stays strong as a single parent by "sticking with Jesus," surrounding herself with godly influences, and investing in her church family.

Because of the impact of Angel Tree on her family, Aimee told her new church about the program. And she stepped out of her comfort zone to lead Angel Tree at her church to make a difference for other families.

#### SPREADING JOY

Today, Aimee's boys continue to receive gifts from their dad at Christmas—but now, like their mom, they spread that joy to other kids.

This past Christmas, Aimee's 11-year-old went with her to deliver Angel Tree gifts to several families. Like the little group that showed up at her trailer seven years ago, Aimee and her son drove around in the dark, climbed porches, and delivered gifts, with the simple explanation that means more than words can express: "This is from your dad."

Jose grew up in El Salvador in a bad area and when he was 12 the gangs were forcing kids to join their gangs, or suffer severe consequences. He got an opportunity to leave the country and come to America. He made it to 8<sup>th</sup> grade, but got in with the wrong crowd. He began doing and dealing drugs and later in 2018, at the age of 25, during a drug deal, he had to defend himself and stabbed a man.

When Jose was arrested and sent here to the PCCF, he asked for a Bible and read it. God's Spirit convicted him of his sins and when he heard the Gospel in Bible Study, he believed and trusted Jesus to save him! Jose speaks fairly good English and has become my new interpreter for the Spanish speaking inmates in the ICE unit! He is growing in the Lord and is teaching the inmates in his unit when I am not there! He is so in love with the Lord and His Word that he committed to studying, evangelizing and teaching the Word daily!

Pastor Alonso Dacouhna is going to start next week as our Spanish/Portuguese Bible study teacher! He was funded by the United Presbytery Church (UPC) and did teach here at PCCF in 2018 until the Covid pandemic stopped all volunteers and contractors from coming into the jail for a couple of years. Alonso lost his funding from the UPC and due to some disagreements over doctrine, has left the UPC and is now with the Evangelical Presbytery Church (EPC). New Hope Correctional Ministry has hired Alonso and this will help us reach the Spanish and Portuguese inmates here at the PCCF!! Alonso is going to be thrilled when he meets Jose and sees what Jose has done in helping us to reach the ICE inmates who speak his language!!

## HELPING OUR NEIGHBORS, COAST TO COAST

DEAR FRIEND.

The wildfire on Maui was the deadliest inferno our nation has seen in more than a century. On the other side of the nation, Hurricane Idalia left a swath of damaged houses

from Florida into Georgia. In both cases, survivors and communities need help to recover and rebuild. Samaritan's Purse has responded in Jesus' Name.

Our work in Lahaina—the capital of the 19th-century Hawaiian kingdom—had to wait on the monthlong search for victims, but our crews are helping islanders recover as they prepare to rebuild.

My son Edward led our team on the ground in Maui, where the devastation and despair were overwhelming. "No one really knows where to turn," he told me. As we work to comfort survivors in Maui, we want them to know they can turn to our Lord and Savior, "who according to His abundant mercy has begotten us again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).



Before Lahaina opened up to relief workers, our teams worked in surrounding communities that had also burned. One resident named Faith was touched by the tireless work of our soot-covered volunteers. "Thank you for digging deep, and for the grace you all have in serving us."

We were blessed to find strong church partners on Maui, and believers there have been quick to answer the call of the Good Samaritan to help their neighbors. As one of our local volunteers shared the Gospel, Faith rededicated her life to the Lord and her husband, Derrick, prayed to receive Jesus Christ as his Savior.

In the wake of Hurricane Idalia, Samaritan's Purse deployed two of our Disaster Relief Units to Florida's Big Bend region and another to hard-hit Valdosta, Georgia. Our crews went straight to work chain-sawing downed trees, tarping damaged roofs, cleaning out houses flooded by a record storm surge, and sharing the hope of the Gospel wherever the Lord led them.

This has been a busy year for our U.S. disaster relief ministry, as we've responded to tornadoes in nine states, floods in four states, and another wildfire in the state of Washington.

Our disaster relief teams respond ASAP—which to us means not only As Soon As Possible, but also "Always Stop And Pray." Near Spokane, Washington, one of our teams was sifting through the ashes of a burned home. One of our workers called a halt and said we needed an ASAP moment. After they stopped and prayed, the Lord immediately led them to find jewelry, ceramic tea cups, and even

wedding rings. Not only did these keepsakes help bring comfort and closure to the people who lived there, but they also demonstrated the power of prayer.

## Finding the Hope of Christ in Ukraine

"God loves you." That's the message we translated into Ukrainian and printed on the blue-and-yellow bags that we've been using to deliver food and other emergency supplies to millions of Ukrainians who have been living under siege for nearly two years.

In one town near the frontlines, our church partners found an elderly woman hiding in her basement. We'll call her Valentyna. She said she had not had bread in months and felt so forsaken that she was ready to take her own life.

After she received food and other assistance from Samaritan's Purse, Valentyna sat

Бог любить тебе! новие саполя down to eat what might have been her last meal. But as she read the message on the bag, she started asking herself if it was really true that God loved her. The next day, she asked workers who came to check on her, and they shared the Gospel and explained just how much God loves us. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). As Valentyna realized the depth of His love, she prayed to receive Jesus Christ as her Lord and Savior.


Five days later, her town was invaded, and Valentyna tragically lost her life. We know that she is forever in the presence of the One whose love was expressed on that bag and then written eternally on her heart.

We heard this testimony from Vera, a courageous Ukrainian believer who was working in the "red zone" when she had the opportunity to share the Gospel with Valentyna. As Ukrainians face another winter under siege, Samaritan's Purse is doing all we can to comfort those living near the frontlines while helping reassure them that God indeed loves them. Our relief projects have reached 14 million people with medical care, 200 million pounds of food, water, wood stoves, roofs, and over a quarter of a million Ukrainian Bibles.

Please continue to pray for the people of Ukraine who are living under the constant threat of attack. We are working with our church partners to meet local needs and help people find hope in Jesus Christ.
