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A WELCOME CHANGE

FOR THE PAST FIVE YEARS, our staff working within the Imvepi Refugee Settlement in northern Uganda have been living in tent housing, with up to four staff members per tent. The tents were uncomfortably hot, and subject to damage from heavy rain. We are incredibly pleased to announce that thanks to very generous funding from some of our key partners, we have completed construction of a new permanent housing facility! It's a welcome change for our Imvepi team.

"Our staff have endured a lot over the years," ChildVoice CEO Nathan Mandsager said while inspecting the new facility and comparing them to the six-year-old canvas tents this month.

OUR STAFF HAVE ENDURED A LOT OVER THE YEARS..

The new structure, constructed of concrete blocks with a steel roof, offers nine separate rooms with lockable doors. Other features include a staff kitchen area, and of course, electrical service. Each room has comfortable beds with frames constructed from steel poles salvaged from the old tents.

"This new building is an achievement," said Richard Kyitarinyeba, Director of ChildVoice Uganda. "And it's a very big motivation to my staff. They are so excited!"

"We are so, so pleased with what you have offered us," added Julius Owori, our Imvepi Program Manager. "We have been battling with the accommodations for the past few years. As of now, we are no longer worried over heat. Our staff are now able to have privacy in their respective rooms. We most appreciate the donors who sacrificed a lot to be sure that we are going to be living this better life."

Immaculate, one of our longest serving staff members at Imvepi, likewise expressed a mixture of excitement and gratitude for the new housing facility. For her, it's a long-awaited relief.



One of ChildVoice's core tenets is the promotion of research in helping child victims of war and exploitation recover from their trauma. In light of that, we were pleased that Haylie Wright, a master's degree student at the University of Edinburgh in Scotland, recently cited ChildVoice as a model nonprofit organization in her master's dissertation (equivalent to a thesis in the US). Haylie's focus was on the therapeutic benefits of sports (and adjacent activities such as art, dance, and drama) as a tool to enhance the efficacy of psychosocial healing for war affected youth. While she was unable to visit our facilities in Uganda, Haylie interviewed multiple staff members both in the US and Uganda.

We recently spoke with Haylie to discuss her motivations, her research, and her thoughts regarding ChildVoice's work and mission...

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I am so grateful to our donors for this new development," Immaculate exclaimed. "I am so excited to enter into my room. I've been in that tent for the last five years!"



AFTERCARE:

Walking Alongside Our Graduates

Aftercare is how ChildVoice provides long-term support to our students after they complete their programs and integrate into their communities. It provides three years of extended support in areas such as job coaching, life skills coaching, supplementary business training, individual and group counseling, and spiritual support. This helps keep students moving forward as they integrate into their communities.

Two of our former Lukome Center students who have benefited greatly



Ketty was likewise forced to be an LRA commander's "bush wife" at a young age. She lived in the bush for 12 years before coming to ChildVoice. Today, she has work that pays well enough for her to send all four of her children to school. Sadly, Ketty's husband was killed earlier this year. ChildVoice provided her with counseling and spiritual support as she worked through her grief.

Both Teddy and Ketty have been doing very well, and have been earning enough income to provide for their families. And through aftercare, they are receiving ongoing support to help them navigate life's challenges.

While in Uganda this month, ChildVoice CEO Nathan Mandsager accompanied three Lukome Center staff members on a trip to check in with two of our former graduates — Teddy and Ketty. The trip was on very rough roads and took just under three hours, underscoring the challenges our aftercare staff members face in continuing to work with former students.

"I'm just very happy to see [Teddy] up to this level." Said Winnie, one of our aftercare team members. "First of all, Teddy is trauma-free. . . I'm also happy for Ketty, because both of them are doing what they have trained to do at ChildVoice."

ChildVoice (CV): Tell us about your background. What were your own personal experiences that formed your worldview and brought you to your academic path?

Haylie Wright (HW): I'm Kiwi-American. I grew up with a kind of awareness of all things international. By the time the "stop Kony" stuff was happening, I was in high school or intermediate years. I was very much just kind of developing as a human and trying to find my voice in a world. But probably since I was about eight or nine years old, I was like, I'm going to move to the continent of Africa. That's all I've ever wanted with my whole life.


And when I got to my gap year [after high school] and I went and taught in Uganda for a few months, in a model that I definitely wouldn't do now. The school needed a teacher and couldn't afford to pay a substitute teacher or an interim teacher for a teacher on maternity leave. Of course, now I would really consider it inappropriate to have a post-high school student just go. So, I went to Uganda and I had a classroom full of South Sudanese refugees.

When I was in Uganda, I experienced acute trauma. There was an accident... and having seen bodies, pulling dead bodies off the road, experiencing just kind of like a war-like scene — a fraction of the experience that these people have gone through, and the trauma. Also, I already kind of was aware of child soldiers, and... I was just really dissatisfied with the fact that we were not dealing with childhood trauma well.

CV: In your dissertation, you focus on the therapeutic benefit of sports when working with child victims of war. What do you think is the core benefit of sport and related activities that creates an environment that engenders the healing process?



Johan's invitation to Zambia in early 2023 was exactly the kind of opportunity I had hoped for. It provided a unique opportunity to spend time on the mission field with my adult son, and I was excited about the four-man team Br Johan put together. Arriving in Lusaka, following a very long day of air travel, we were greeted by Br Matthew, a wonderful servant-hearted brother that made us feel welcome from the first "Hello." We quickly realized why Br Johan has placed so much faith in this man of God. He epitomizes humility and leadership. He would become not only our host, but our driver, our translator and our "fifth man." The evening spent with Br Matthew's family was a wonderful respite and we slept well in their beautiful home. Good thing, as the next day would present us with many rough hours and miles driving across Zambia's beautiful landscape. The drive included a stretch through the renowned Kafue National Park. We were blessed to see buffalo, boar, gazelle and even a few young bull elephants on our way to Mongu, our destination for a week of ministry.

Mongu is a wonderful community in Zambia's Western Province and at the heart of the Lozi people. We felt welcomed the moment we arrived. Plans included two days of pastoral/leadership training, but those plans would quickly change. Our first day among the pastors & leaders was profound, as our Brother Jay shared his teaching on "suffering well." Engagement in the group was more than we expected, as the questions and discussion seemed inexhaustible.

Our plans for a second day of ministry to church leaders was quickly modified, as we arrived at the newly constructed Mongu conference center and discovered a massive gathering of youth. The team Br Johan had prepared was ready to pivot and we divided the group by age. The day proved to be another wonderful time of question/answer and discussion, as well as gospel outreach into the community with the young people. The following day (Sunday) was spent worshiping with the community and those gathered for the conference. We were treated to local music and dance as Br Jay delivered the message.

As I reflect on time spent with the Mongu community of believers, as well as Br Johan's wonderful ministry team, my biggest takeaways are: 1) The work there is having a generational impact, as people deploy the "disciples making disciples who make disciples" doctrine. 2) The leadership is both competent and ambitious for the work of the Lord. 3) The hospitality shown by the body of Christ was sincere and humbling. 4) There is much to be done among a hungry people

group...they desire as much engagement as we could offer, and more. 5) God is moving upon the youth of Zambia to change their generation I was blessed to be a part of such an impactful trip. I hope to return someday very soon. Tobey Bouch

summer. She is also looking forward to becoming a counselor "to give the next kids that are here the same opportunity that I had."


She says that being at camp helped her grow closer to God because she learned from other campers and the counselors as she got to see how close of a relationship they each had with Christ.

These women—many of them moms—are lonely and struggling. They hunger for love and hope. You and I know Jesus is the answer, and you can offer the opportunity for new life through your support!



It was Jermaine's first arrest, but he was no stranger to flashing blue lights. In his Leavenworth, Kansas, neighborhood, Jermaine often witnessed

violence, drugs, and arrests.
And for a while, his dad
struggled with addiction
and cycled in and out of
prison.

While growing up, Jermaine wanted desperately to be accepted, but other kids made fun of him, calling him "Too short, too fat, too ugly." When he was praised for his crime, Jermaine committed more to command respect.

At 15, he was sentenced to four years in juvenile corrections for robbery. By 19, he was both addicted to drugs and dealing them. He'd also become a father. And then he was arrested again and sentenced to three years in prison.

"For the first time in my life, I felt free!"

Behind sober situation

Behind bars, Jermaine got sober and the reality of his situation hit hard: If I don't change my life, I'm either

going to spend the rest of my life in prison or end up dead.

When Jermaine heard about Prison Fellowship Academy, he was curious to see what it offered. When he joined, Jermaine was warmly welcomed and given much-needed support.

But a few months into the program, separation from his family weighed heavily on Jermaine. In tears, he cried out, "God, if you are truly real, please forgive me of my sins. Give me another chance to be with my family."

FREE FOR THE FIRST TIME

A peace washed over him and he says, "For the first time in my life, I felt free!"

God also used Prison Fellowship Angel Tree to help heal his family. While he was incarcerated, local church volunteers delivered a gift to his young son on Jermaine's behalf.

After his release in 2010, Jermaine struggled to find a job. Eventually, someone gave him a chance. That led to other jobs and promotions. He also married his longtime girlfriend and is now the proud father of five kids.



In 2015, Jermaine founded a nonprofit. He was also able to return to prison as a volunteer to encourage others. And, in 2018, Jermaine got a job helping prisoners find jobs upon their release.

Jermaine became an ordained minister. And then, in response to encouragement from many community members, he ran for office—first becoming the city commissioner and then mayor of his hometown.

In 2021, Prison Fellowship hired Jermaine to support prison ministry programs in Kansas.

AN AMBASSADOR OF HOPE

In the summer of 2023, Jermaine's role with Prison Fellowship changed to make even better use of his strengths and experience. He is now our

mission ambassador—making sure our supporters know they are transforming lives through their giving. He will also share his story in prisons across the country.

Jermaine wants prisoners to know: "Your current situation is not your final destination. God is going to use you to do great things but hold on because the best is yet to come."

His favorite roles are husband and dad and he loves family time—going to church, playing Uno, watching movies, and coaching his kids' teams.

"I really want to see my kids be who God called them to be," says Jermaine.

Once a man who tried to gain respect by being tough, Jermaine now gains respect by standing tall in his faith. He says, "The moment I became who God called me to be, that's when my life began to take off and when I began to succeed."

Back in the early days of Angel Tree, Chuck Colson, founder of Prison Fellowship, and his wife often personally delivered Christmas presents. One night, they discovered their directions had led them to a housing project in a rundown and poorly lit neighborhood. The Colsons knocked on the door, and a little boy answered. His father was in prison.

"The boy's eyes brightened when he saw the presents in our arms," Chuck recalled. "The little guy pulled us into his living room. There was nothing but a chair, an old sofa with the stuffing exposed, and a tree leaning haphazardly against the wall."

That night, Chuck opened his Bible to the Gospel of Matthew and said, "Do you know what your name means? It means 'God with us!"

At that, Emmanuel ran to his mother and hugged her around her

legs. "Mommy, Mommy!" he cried. "God is with us!"

As Chuck later recalled, "Even in that seemingly hopeless, druginfested housing project, this apartment had become an island of joy and hope. Once again, Jesus had become real."

This Christmas, thousands of

children will hear the story of hope delivered by angels to shepherds that first Christmas many years ago. It was the story Chuck spent his life bringing to families like Emmanuel's.

was just in Israel where Samaritan's Purse is working to help after the Hamas terrorist attacks that killed 1,200 people on Oct. 7. This is still a dangerous place. The bloodstains are still on the ground, the smell of death is still in the air, Hamas missiles are still being shot over, and fighter jets are still overhead.

As I talked with survivors, family members, and leaders, I was struck by the brazen brutality of Hamas. There is no other word to describe it than evil—pure evil. It was like every demon in Hell was turned loose.

I met a young woman named Lihi who had come back to her village to get a few things from her house. She and her two small children hid in their home and survived the attack. Her husband, Daniel, was a physician who heard the gunfire and ran to the medical clinic where he worked just a few hundred yards away. While he was

there treating the injured and trying to save lives, he and everyone else but two people were murdered—and then Hamas threw in hand grenades to wipe out the facility and any survivors. In tears, Lihi told me that he was the love of her life.

I also met the mother of a woman who was one of the first responders who was killed as she took the wounded into a clinic attacked by Hamas. This mother and her other three adult daughters were absolutely heartbroken and devastated, as are so many there. She told me solemnly that she was thankful at least that her daughter had not been taken hostage and exposed to the torture and suffering as so many were.

I prayed for the family members and community leaders that I met. As I shared the Word of God with those I talked with, it brought comfort, like balm to their wounded souls. I also met and prayed with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. He expressed appreciation for how Samaritan's Purse is responding. He said, "The fact that you are coming here,

standing with Israel—in Israel—is mightily important and gives us a lot of strength, a lot of encouragement." I asked if I could pray for him, and I asked God to protect the nation of

Israel, and give him strength and wisdom in the midst of these very difficult days.

When Hamas invaded, they also targeted and destroyed ambulances. Fourteen ambulances of Magen David Adom, the nation's first responder service, were destroyed and 11 of their staff were killed. Samaritan's Purse had already committed to replacing those 14, and while I was there, I saw the great need and told them we would provide seven more armored ambulances to help protect their first responders from sniper fire.

We are also working with church partners in Israel as well as in Gaza and the West Bank to provide thousands of displaced families with food and other assistance.



"Generations to come will remember this help," said Uri Shacham, chief of staff for Magen David Adom, whose ambulance corps is 80 percent staffed by volunteers. It was humbling when they made me an honorary member of their organization.

Hamas has vowed to annihilate Israel, denying the truth that God Almighty promised this land to His chosen people. "For you are a holy people to the Lord your God; the Lord your God has chosen you to be a people for Himself, a special treasure above all the peoples on the face of the earth" (Deuteronomy 7:6).

FIRST RESPONDERS: I had the opportunity to thank ambulance drivers who worked heroically under fire to treat the wounded. We are replacing ambulances destroyed in the attack.

As we pray for the peace of Jerusalem (Psalm 122:6), let's also lift up the families in Gaza who are living in desperate conditions, even as Hamas uses them as human shields and their hospitals as camouflage. Humanitarian access in Gaza has been limited, but Samaritan's Purse has long-standing Christian partners there, and we are working hard to equip them to help their neighbors.
