

DEAR FRIEND,

Hurricane Beryl has ripped across the Caribbean, devastating several islands before slashing across the Yucatan peninsula of Mexico and plowing into Texas. Beryl was the earliest Category 5 hurricane ever seen in the Atlantic Ocean. On Union Island, home to 3,000 people, the hurricane wiped out 90 percent of the houses.

Samaritan's Purse has flown four airlifts with our DC-8 cargo jet to deliver emergency relief to four islands spanning three countries. We set up an Emergency Field Hospital on Carriacou, an island of 10,000 people that is part of the nation of Grenada; are sending a mobile medical team to Union Island in Saint Vincent and the Grenadines; and distributed tarps and emergency kits to Jamaica and Petite Martinique.

Beryl tore the roof off of Carriacou's only hospital, so our field hospital is the only facility offering inpatient care and lab work on the island. Our first patient was a man named Vincent whose home was destroyed, and he needed treatment for diabetes. His wife Yamaira said, "We thank you very much for coming and rescuing Carriacou. May God bless everyone."

Please join us in praying for storm victims across the Caribbean.

Beryl was a Category 1 hurricane when it made landfall in a flood-prone section of Texas. Samaritan's Purse deployed a U.S. Disaster Relief unit to Angleton, Texas, south of Houston in an area where we have a long history of ministry.

Calling for Volunteer Reinforcements on the Homefront

This has been a busy storm season for Samaritan's Purse, as we've responded 19 times to 12 states in response to tornadoes, flooding, and wildfires from the Southwest and the Great Plains to the Florida Panhandle. There are hundreds of families in Florida, Arkansas, New Mexico, Iowa, and Minnesota who still need our help.

We're thankful to God for providing resources for us to be able to respond in many of these places by sending our disaster relief units stocked with tools along with other equipment. We've had to expand our fleet of disaster relief trucks in an effort to keep up with the needs.

An army of volunteers whose hearts are sold out for the Gospel make this ministry possible. Those who serve with us often say it's a blessing to them, and everywhere they go they see the Lord at work changing lives. Over the past 10 years, close to 7,000 souls across America have trusted Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior through our disaster relief ministry. Praise God!

As busy as our U.S. disaster relief volunteers have been, we need reinforcements. Many of our volunteers have already responded four or five times this year.

Our volunteers come from all walks of life. Tommy Smith is a retired logger from Virginia who has been volunteering with Samaritan's Purse for 19 years—even

continuing to serve after a cancer diagnosis. Last year, he was among the first on the scene after a tornado hit Selma, Alabama, and he was part of a hard-working crew that made it possible for Annie Pearl Avery to return to her home after spending a night in her pickup truck.

Annie told our volunteers how she had participated in the 1965 civil rights march that made Selma famous. As Tommy presented her with a Bible signed by the volunteers, he explained that the team was also on a mission: "Everything we do is only to glorify Jesus," he said.

In addition to those faithful volunteers who have served for years, we're also thankful to see a new generation willing to step up to help hurting people for the sake of the Gospel. After a tornado hit Tallahassee, 16-year-old Caleb and his mother served distressed residents. He clearly saw how

helping others can soften hearts to the Good News. He was particularly moved by a man whose home had suffered extensive damage even as he was dealing with a chronic health condition and the death of one of his sons. Caleb said, "The homeowner just kept repeating over and over again that nobody had ever done anything like this for him. When we gave him the Bible at the end of the day, he had tears in his eyes." Caleb challenged other young people to get involved: "The world is not in a good place, but you can be a light for Christ. Serve. Share the Gospel. It may seem hard, but you have been given a gift from God. He wants you to share it."

We thank God for the many Samaritan's Purse volunteers who give of their time and talents to help the hurting and share the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. 
Our hearts are overwhelmed by the number of lives you are helping transform and all the futures you're brightening.

Initially, Robert was reluctant to ask for assistance. But he knew his daughter needed a stable environment, so for her sake, he came to our shelter. The two of them spent 90 days here and received support to obtain their own apartment.

At Camp CONNRI, children discover a whole new world

When Serenity first went to The Salvation Army's Camp CONNRI around age 10, she never imagined it could change her life.

It began as soon as she met the staff. "They welcomed you and made you feel safe," says Serenity. "It was nice to have that feeling, especially if it's your first time away from your parents. I was able to meet new people and make friends."

Your generosity helps boys and girls like her open their eyes to a world they've never seen before. "A lot of children come from the inner city, so they don't have the opportunity to be in the open air most of the day," says Captain Jina Bang, Divisional Youth Secretary. "We get them away from cell phones, video games, and just really spend time out here in nature."

Campers can develop new skills and discover their talents. "I loved swimming and arts and crafts," says Serenity. Other activities include rock-wall climbing, soccer, archery, Bible study, nature activities, and more.

Children also learn – some for the very first time – that God loves them.

Serenity says, "Camp definitely impacted my life with Jesus Theater," which shares the gospel story using both Christian and popular music. "I was bawling

Today, Clifford plays college basketball and is set to graduate with an engineering degree. He hopes to join the NBA following his collegiate career.



Toby didn't learn any healthy coping skills and instead turned to marijuana at a young age.

He spent the next 20 years taking a variety of drugs to numb his pain. Toby was also dealing drugs to make money. He was 28 the first time he was sent to prison and served three years.

Between prison sentences, Toby met the woman who is now his wife. She had also served time in prison and struggled with drugs.

"HE'S THE DIFFERENCE"

When Toby went behind bars a second time, he met a man who led a Bible study at the jail. As Toby started asking him questions, he discovered their stories were very similar.

"But there was a difference. He was happy and joyful, and I was miserable. And I'm like, 'What's the difference?' And he's like, 'Listen, I got Jesus. He's the difference," Toby says. "So I went to my jail cell that night and I prayed.

I gave my life to God."

That man who led the Bible study became Toby's sponsor in Celebrate Recovery, a biblically based addiction recovery program.

There have been some ups and downs over the past eight years, including a few more years in prison when past crimes caught up with Toby. But during his last prison sentence, he learned about Prison Fellowship.

Toby was given an issue of Inside Journal, Prison Fellowship's publication just for prisoners.

AMAZING IMPACT

He used Inside Journal to grow in his faith and says, "I thought it was just an amazing way that even though we're behind bars, we're getting connected through a ministry that cares enough to love us and reach

out with God's love."

Toby also learned about Angel Tree Christmas and signed up his three daughters. He was grateful because he knew it would be hard for his wife to provide much on just her income.

Now, Toby serves as an Angel Tree coordinator at his church. The impact of the ministry really stuck with him. He says, "My daughters were lacking a father figure, but a hint of the Father's love was shown to them through the Angel Tree ministry, and words can't describe that."

Toby also leads Celebrate Recovery with his wife at their church. He is thankful to be giving back by helping others in their recovery journey.





AT IMVEPI REFUGEE SETTLEMENT

MARKING A MILESTONE for our six-year-old Girl Empowerment Centers in Imvepi Refugee Settlement, 46 remarkable students of Imvepi Class 6 celebrated the completion of their programs with a joyful and festive graduation ceremony. The ceremony was attended by over 800 people, including local community members and leaders, nonprofit partners, and dignitaries from the Office of Prime Minister.

One of the key speakers was Desire Jocelyn, a graduate who also attends a local school and is at the top of her school's class. She talked about how she was able to earn and save enough money to buy her own sewing machine, which she uses to make uniforms to sell to her school. Another speaker, Mary, is a former ChildVoice student now in the aftercare phase of

her program. She gave an inspirational speech in which she discussed how Child-Voice found her, what she learned through ChildVoice, what she did after graduating, and who she is today.

The graduates all received graduation certificates during the ceremony. These reflected the vocational areas of hair dressing and tailoring. Following the presentation of the certificates, graduates and those in atten-

dance enjoyed a time of music, dancing and smorgasbord of delicious foods.

Imvepi Program Manager Julius Owori added that while not reflected on their certificates, students also pursued bar soap making and agriculture. "We are trying to see how to introduce agriculture as an independent skill," he added.

Prior to the day of the graduation ceremony, Julius and other ChildVoice staff members conducted community pre-release discussions at all four of our Girl Empowerment Centers. (continued >>)

Students who pass the DIT demonstrate they possess the knowledge and skills necessary to be successful in a specific vocational field.

"We had to conduct a dialogue informing the community, the parents and the leadership of Imvepi what to expect from us after the girls graduate, and what we expect from them," Julius explained.

We are so proud of what all our Imvepi graduates have accomplished, and we remain dedicated to helping them navigate life's uncertainties as they put their skills to use within their communities.

Co-Directors on the Importance of Community Service

During his trip to Nigeria in June, ChildVoice CEO Nathan Mandsager took the opportunity to sit down with our Nigeria Country Co-Directors Rebecca Malgwi and David Jomusu to talk about their work and the importance of engaging students in community service. The theme of giving back to their communities figured heavily in the conversation. Below is a transcript of the interview:



David: My name is David Jomusu, one of the co-country heads here in Nigeria. I believe community service has [been helping] communities try to work with us. And the beneficiaries we are working with are able to understand we are . . . teaching them that at the end of our activities with them, maybe after graduation, it is expected of them to give back to the community.



Becky: Hi, I'm Rebecca, I'm also his co-leader, one of the country heads in Nigeria. To add to what he has said, I think community service is a way of teaching our girls and boys selflessness, you know, to be able to help others in need, and to be able to think about others apart from yourself.

She cycled in and out of jails, each time paying bail for her release. Between her arrests, Kassie participated in many different treatment programs, but nothing made a difference. With each return to the streets, Kassie's criminal activity increased. Eventually, she was convicted and given a 21-month sentence with no option for bail.

Kassie decided to use the time wisely, knowing it was a chance for her to sober up, get away from bad influences, and reflect. She wanted to participate in programming, and after searching for and applying to a few different programs, she was accepted to the Prison Fellowship Academy[®].

It was during this time that Kassie regained contact with her children. She used their visits and phone calls to share the lessons she was learning in the Academy, hoping her children might make better choices than she had.

Kassie now works at a recovery house as a recovery specialist, where she is able to share her testimony with others struggling in addiction. Many times, Christians are told to avoid talking about their faith while in this role—but because Kassie's journey to recovery was directly linked to the Academy, Minnesota Adult and Teen Challenge, and her faith, she is granted permission to share.


It's July already......



I'm back from Ukraine and I wish I could share all of these highlights and stories over a cup of delicious Ukrainian coffee and a bar of Lviv chocolate, but this longer newsletter with lots of pictures will have to do for now.



A week of camp & more!

With the Local Church

Every camp is organized and hosted by a local church in partnership with Josiah Venture. At this camp, Philadelphia Church in Ternopil invited four Josiah Venture Interns, a former intern/ future JV missionary Hayley Arnold, and me to join them. 33 campers joined us and we had an awesome week!



Every afternoon a leader from the local church hosted workshops based around painting, sports, games, or a very specific hobby like linocut block printing or brewing specialty coffee. Some leaders and students were already making plans for how to continue connecting over these hobbies after camp!





English Class

After getting to revamp our JV English curriculum this winter I got the chance

to actually use it with this group of advanced students at camp! Every morning we worked on ways to level up their English through pronunciation, some grammar, new vocabulary, and lots of fun. I was thankful for the ways I could connect with the students, especially **Ann and Dasha** (Dasha and I are holding up Ann in our class picture below). Dasha, a believer, is currently living in Northern Ireland because of the war so her English was amazing and she was a great help in the class. She quickly became friends with Ann who was a bit shy to use her English but by the end of the week she was far more confident!

Labyrinth

The Labyrinth is an interactive time of reflection for students to think more deeply and personally about what they have been learning about Jesus and the Gospel. I love it because instead of just asking students to think about what their dreams are there is a station with prompts, pens, and pictures for them to write out their dreams. But the next station helps them confront the possibility that their dreams may not happen because of things they have done and things done to them. And is life about fulfilling our dreams?





At another station, students are invited to try tasty-looking snacks (looking being the key word) labeled with things we use to try and fix our problems like "family," "more effort," "religion," and "self-development." As they try the foods they realize they actually don't taste very good (because they've been sprinkled with a variety of odd spices.) It isn't that these things are bad, but they do not satisfy like Jesus does as the bread of life.

Conveniently there is some delicious bread at this station too (with no weird spices.)

Additional stations walk students through the gospel more clearly and offer the opportunity to pray with a leader. Praise God several students chose to spend time in the prayer room and some prayed prayers of repentance and belief!



We were so grateful this camp facility had such a nice place for our labyrinth outside and the weather was okay!


Follow Up

A key part of camp is actually what happens AFTER camp! It is great that students are invited to come and see who Jesus is at camp, but what will happen to them if no one follows up with them and they never get connected to a local church?

Realities of the War

Our week of camp was great, but the realities of war are still everywhere. A schedule of rolling blackouts means the power is only on 1/3-1/2 of the time. Red and black flags everywhere memorialize those who have died in the war. Male leaders especially feel the pressure of mobilization. Several campers and leaders had come from harder-hit cities in the east like Kharkiv and Mariupol. Every leader and camper has endured some degree of trauma, which has lasting effects on the body and soul. My week and a half in Ukraine gave

me a glimpse of the reality Ukrainians have been living in for the past 2.5 years and I now know at a deeper level how to pray with them. Will you pray with me as well?

Subject: A Landmark Bill and a Life Forever Changed



Seek justice. Love mercy. Restore hope.

Dear Thomas,

We're so grateful to partner with friends like you who want to see Jesus glorified as we seek justice, love mercy, and restore hope. As you may know, our advocacy team works tirelessly to help bring about a more transformative justice system. We link arms with justice-minded men and women like you, from all walks of life, to champion fairer laws and expose the barriers faced by people with a criminal record.

One of these advocates is a woman named Kacie Starr. Before she partnered with us, she became one of the youngest-ever elected officials in St. Louis, Missouri, at age 26. But after misusing campaign funds, she resigned from office and chose not to pursue her dream of running for Congress.

"The theft lasted a couple of years, and nobody knew. But Jesus did," said Kacie. With her mom's help, she rediscovered the faith of her childhood. Kacie later came clean about her crimes.

Though she never went to prison, Kacie paid restitution. She struggled to find a new job due to her criminal past and turned to sewing, a skill she had picked up from her grandmother. In 2022, she opened the Sew Hope Community Sewing Room and later began leading a prison ministry in St. Louis with her husband.

Kacie also volunteers as a Prison Fellowship Justice Ambassador. Through personalized coaching in advocacy and storytelling, Kacie learned to leverage her experiences to advocate for cultural change.

Just a few weeks ago she joined us in Washington, D.C., to share her story and urge lawmakers to pass the Federal Prison Oversight Act. This landmark bill, which has now passed both the House and the Senate, will pave the way to make prison conditions safer and more humane for the incarcerated and for staff.

"We get to do the work that God has called us to do and make lasting change within the public square," says Kacie.
