"I didn't know there was such thing as a dysfunctional family," Rusty says. "That's how good my childhood was." But after spending a summer during high school in the National

Guard, Rusty decided he didn't have to listen to his parents or anyone else.

He started making his own rules—which included bad choices like drinking and drugs.

Rusty says that for seven years, he "got away with just being an outlaw." When the law caught up with him, Rusty lashed out at the police officers.

"I wanted to fight them every time," Rusty says, describing his arrests. "I wanted someone to shoot me."

His decisions also led to instability in his relationships. Rusty married a woman, had two children with her, then left. He met another woman, Brandy, and had two more children with her.

"There was no future in my life that I could see. There was no hope. There was nothing," Rusty says. He was desperate.

"There was no hope. There was nothing." The different charges—drug related, felony assault on a police officer, and first-degree burglary—landed him in prison repeatedly.

While incarcerated, Rusty participated in Prison Fellowship Angel Tree. He was thankful for the opportunity to connect with his children, but he didn't fully realize the impact of the program until years later. He discovered his son saved the gifts he received for many years.

"My grandma loved Angel Tree because she got to be the contact," Rusty remembers. "She'd bring the Christmas presents to my kids. Angel Tree was part of me connecting."

GOD GOT HIS ATTENTION

When Rusty arrived in prison for the fourth time, Trevor, a good friend from high school, was serving a life sentence in the same prison. Rusty discovered that Trevor had become a Christian.

And even though Rusty didn't want anything to do with Jesus, Trevor kept talking to him.

When Rusty got invited to a weekend ministry event in the prison's gym, he said yes just to get a break from being in his cell.
On the third day, God got his attention.

"I gave Jesus everything that day," Rusty says. "God put His kingdom around me after I gave my life to Him.
He just restored everything that had been taken by the devil."

Rusty was released in 2012. He moved to a ministry home, got a job, and gradually paid off his fines.

When Brandy, the mother of two of his kids, showed up at the ministry

home, Rusty knew she was on drugs. Finally sober, Rusty told Brandy he had changed and couldn't be around her.

Brandy asked him, "How do you get this God and I don't get anything?"

Rusty gave her the phone number for a women's ministry home, and after repeated calls, she got in. Six months later, when he saw Brandy again, she had given her life to Jesus!

SURPRISED BY GOD

When Rusty first became a Christian, he prayed to God, "Give me someone to serve with." He never dreamed it would be the mother of two of his kids! They got married and have been serving God together ever since. God has also helped Rusty reconnect with his kids, his grandkids, and his parents.

BACK BEHIND BARS FOR GOD

After serving in a few different ministries and earning a degree in community counseling, Rusty was led back to prison by God. In April 2023, Rusty took on the position of Prison Fellowship Academy program manager. He feels blessed to teach biblically based principles, lead community-building events, and meet one-on-one with the men.

"It's a miracle that Jesus saved me," Rusty admits. "And it's a miracle that I've come full circle and am back to the place where He saved me."



Dear Friends & Family,

When we think of the Christmas story, we usually picture a manger-born baby Jesus, held by his mother, as shepherds, angels and wisemen worshipfully approach. The scene is the quintessential Christmas card! We don't usually think of baby Jesus as a "destroyer." However, this is how John the Apostle describes Jesus, giving us the whole story of Christmas and the real reason for the Christmas season: Jesus was to destroy the works of the devil!

Jesus' birth was the beginning of the end of this earthly world's struggle with sin and its power to detach us from a Holy God. Jesus did not come so we could open presents under a Christmas tree (which is certainly fun), Jesus came to do battle with the devil's weapons of immorality, idolatry, division, anger, jealousy and selfishness. Jesus won this battle and set us free from the chains of death and reconnected us to a new life with God. As we reflect this advent season, let's celebrate what began in a manger, but also celebrate what was accomplished on the cross!

So much has transpired this past year, and the world is still well-stocked with all of the devil's weapons, especially those of anger, idolatry and selfishness. Our world can seem dark, but as light-bearers of Christ, we have tremendous power to not only resist the dark works, but to shine the whole truth of Jesus Christ, every day of the year! This is my eighth Christmas season with Caring Families, and I'm reminded just how brightly Caring Families shines. Consider "Olivia's" story when she visited our center a couple weeks ago.

Olivia tested positive on a home pregnancy test and wanted an abortion. She shared with us that she didn't believe in abortion and felt like it was wrong, but that she still had to have an abortion because there was no other option. Olivia had just welcomed a baby girl a few months prior, and this new pregnancy was now "too much." Not only did Olivia feel it was unfair for her to divide attention between two babies, but she also shared she was overwhelmed parenting and caring for her new infant. When we ran the pregnancy test in the center, it came up negative. Olivia was surprised and we would later discover she had misread her earlier test.

It's alarming to think that had she ordered the abortion pill online or received it after a telehealth appointment, she would have experienced the physical complications along with the guilt and shame of going against her own beliefs. We took the time to listen and discovered that Olivia felt alone, unsupported, and unprepared as a new mom. We are going to see Olivia again and are committed to walking alongside her, loving and supporting her, so she never feels alone! Had Olivia gone elsewhere, it's likely no one would have ever discovered she was struggling as a new mom and the underlying issues of her pregnancy decision would never have been discussed. Our HOPE is Olivia will not only grow as a parent to her current child, but she will be best prepared to deal with any of life's unexpected "surprises" along with sharing with her future family a newfound culture of life!



Olivia is a reminder of exactly why Caring Families is here, and why the full scope of our services matter and how we are not just changing lives but saving lives! Accurate medical testing and information, a compassionate listening ear, and a strong support system for parents go hand in hand in changing the culture for life. Our client's lives can be transformed when they start to realize that they are not alone, and there are real people that really care about them. Many of our clients this year shared the same sentiments that Olivia had, that abortion was something they felt was wrong, but they had no choice. They hear this message over and over again. It comes from our politics, stories from celebrities, and pressures from family and friends. Often it is the baby's father's voice that is the loudest.

It's been a privilege this year to see Caring Families' amazing staff walk alongside and serve so many of our clients who are faced with an unexpected pregnancy. They've patiently helped facilitate and mediate conversations with family members, helping our clients find support with their family and friends. They've connected clients to local agencies and resources they didn't know were there. They have encouraged fathers to be more involved, step up and become dads. They cherish the opportunities when they are asked to pray for clients who initially said they didn't want anything to do with God or start to ask questions about the Bible and God. Not every case ends in a decision for life, but so many do because of the personal effort and connections of those serving Caring Families. If it sounds like I'm bragging about our staff, I admittedly am. Afterall it's our people, and their love for their neighbors, that separates Caring Families from just a medical clinic or social agency. Our clients are not just another customer or number, rather they are real people who see the Love of Christ shine in every conversation, every diaper or car seat handed out, every ultrasound, every hug and every prayer. None of this would be possible without our donors, and I consider each of you an essential part of our staff. Your prayers, your cards of encouragement, your time and your treasures make this ministry possible.

As we close out 2024, would you consider giving a year end gift to help us continue to shine a light of love in the lives of the many women who are faced with an unexpected pregnancy? I send blessings to you, my brothers and sisters, in the name of God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. I pray that you are all staying close to Him and are seeking comfort in His arms during these rapidly changing times.

I wanted to provide you with an update about the New Hope Correctional Ministry. We continue to do God's will at Plymouth Country Correctional. Our team continues to be led by Dan Croce, founder, president, and senior chaplain. I continue to work as the assistant chaplain. We are pleased to share that we have added a third chaplain, Alonso Dacunha. He preaches to our non-English-speaking inmates and is fluent in Spanish, Portuguese, and English. With the increase in immigrants in jail this is a true blessing and is crucial in spreading Gods message.


We continue to go in daily as volunteers and more importantly as messengers of Christ. We are blessed to have the ongoing support of Sheriff Joseph D. McDonald Jr. During our interactions, we are there to show God's love and spread the good news of Jesus Christ to the inmates and staff. We are following The Great Commission, as it was spoken in Matthew 28:19-20, "¹⁹Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20, ESV.)

Daily we minister to inmates who have lost everything: freedom, jobs, homes, vehicles, even their family. They are at a point where they only have two options: change so they can join God or continue to fall into the pit of Hell. Spreading the good news in the prison is essential and part of our discipleship duties. The book of Isaiah tells us: "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor; He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound;" (Isaiah 61:1 ESV.)

Daily our team spreads the word of God to the inmates. We teach about His love, grace, and forgiveness. We explain how it is essential to come to Him and humble oneself, asking for His forgiveness and to have mercy on us. Our work is paying off and we are seeing prisoners actively attending Bible studies and church services. During their downtime, they are completing Bible lessons. Those who complete these studies receive a personalized Bible. We have inmates who now lead Bible studies outside of our services as they also have become dedicated to Jesus' way.

Thank you for supporting us. We pray that the new year brings you closer to God and His will for you. We look forward to seeing you soon.

The day was marked by colorful activities, including food, music, and dance. ChildVoice CEO, Nathan Mandsager, was there to take part in the festivities, along with a team from Lutheran Church of Hope of Des Moines, Iowa. Also in attendance were several dignitaries, including Paul Kenya, UNHCR's Head of Sub-Office for West Nile. Mr. Kenya entertained the impressively large crowd of celebrants with an inspirational rap "I Believe I Can" he wrote for our students, encouraging them to remember they now have the skills they need to change their lives. Students joined in during the joyful call-and-response rap session, chanting "I know I can, be what I wanna be!"

The ceremony was marked by Martha's moving speech. She implored students to make good use of all they have learned, asked parents and community leaders to work to end the stigma and abuse that victims of exploitation often endure, and offered thanks to ChildVoice staff, donors, and partners for their devotion to child mothers and their children.

UPDATE: MUBI, NIGERIA

Students in our Mubi program in northeastern Nigeria have been busy growing crops of maize and sorghum, as well as learning to raise chickens in order to bring both eggs and chickens to market.

Also, our pilot tailoring apprenticeship program continues going well. We have a new cohort of 20 students in the program. The 40 Students from the first cohort are now working in workshops.

As Class 16 girls were finishing their time at the center, Class 17 students had recently arrived and were settling into life on campus. This group has some of the youngest girls we've seen at the center, two of them only 13 years old. They all have endured their own traumas and each one of them faces unique challenges.

But as ChildVoice CEO Nathan Mandsager commented: "They are all adjusting well so far to their new journey toward healing and transformation. As one of the girls commented to our staff last week, 'This Center is like heaven on earth!" Please join us in welcoming these adolescent girls as they begin their journey toward hope and healing.



A VISITOR REFLECTS ON THE LUKOME CENTER

A team from Lutheran Church of Hope in Des Moines, lowa, visited the Lukome Center in Uganda in September. While there, they were able to get a glimpse of what life at the center is like for our students, including how they are healing and learning during their 20-month programs as well as how great the need is for our programs. One of these visitors, Dina Remington, took time to reflect and share her thoughts with us.

"I learned that abuse does not discriminate, that it happens whether you are old or young, rich or poor, no matter what your skin color is or what geographic area you live in," Dina said. "Unfortunately, sexual abuse is prevalent across all of those."

'From Devastation To Celebration'

DEAR FRIEND.


s Christmas approaches, we continue to see so much need all around us. Our disaster relief teams have served thousands of storm-stricken families. Meanwhile, we've been collecting and shipping Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts to millions of children worldwide.

Hurricane Helene brought out the best in our neighbors, volunteers, and church partners. Close to 30,000 volunteers have served in Jesus' Name at Samaritan's Purse emergency bases across three states. They've made great progress in mudding out flooded houses, removing trees and debris, and tarping roofs. We're also planning to rebuild hundreds of houses and replace hundreds of mobile homes.

I think you'll be inspired to hear how God has worked in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene in places like Damascus, Virginia, named after the Damascus Road where the Apostle Paul encountered the risen Christ. The First Baptist Church of Damascus sits on another famous thoroughfare, as the Appalachian Trail follows the sidewalk leading to the front door. This congregation works year-round to pack Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes, but they lost everything when a raging creek swept through their sanctuary.

As church members dealt with the muddy devastation, they also grieved for the lost opportunity to share the joy of Christmas with children on the other side of the world. Then the nearby Glade Spring Baptist Church stepped up, mobilizing neighbors to pack hundreds of additional shoeboxes, making sure that no children would be left out. "We went from devastation to celebration," said Angie Fritz, a church member in Damascus.

Shoebox gifts from a mountain church might seem like a drop in the bucket, but it all adds up. We're still



Wherever Samaritan's Purse is working, whether we're preparing shoebox gifts or patching roofs, our priority is to share the hope we have in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, who came from Heaven to deliver us from our sins. 'He Was Born to Save Us'

"I put my trust in Jesus—He is the One who came and died for our sins. He was born to save us."

The First Baptist Church in Spruce Pine, North Carolina, embraced Operation Christmas Child as a missions outreach that is also an opportunity for healing. "When people hurt, the best medicine is giving," Pastor Rocky



Branch said. The church has been a lifeline for the people of Spruce Pine, where the downtown was wiped out by flooding. The church cranked up its generator to provide the only lights in town, served over 40,000 meals, and turned its sanctuary into a pantry. In the midst of its relief work, the church packed and collected thousands of shoebox gifts for Operation Christmas Child. **Scan the QR code** to hear my daughter-in-law, Kristy Graham, reporting from Spruce Pine.

As this year ends, all of us at Samaritan's Purse want to thank everyone who has been a part of this ministry through your prayers, donations, and volunteer service. We couldn't do this without you.
